Procession to the Earth Station

and sons of God—soil for bearing plants to sustain the

planet's life and yield bread for all people.

it to the few. I exploit and overuse it. I waste its bread,

while many starve.

Celebrant: O God, who wore our clay in Christ, we confess we

have not shared the land; we have broken our bond

with the earth and one another.
