Notes from Your Interim Rector

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"I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent ..." — BCP, 1979

Although it seems like just yesterday we were at the manger with the wise men, today we're preparing to begin a holy Lenten season. I don't know about you, but this time of year I find I'm ready for Lent. I'm ready to slow down and find ways to be more mindful, more grounded. Lent gives me a chance to back away from the frenzy for a moment and find a gentle, safe place to rest my soul. I think most of us have moved away from the severely penitential type of Lent we may have known in our youth, but I think there's something to be said for taking time to look clearly at the darkness in our world and in our own souls. It keeps us honest.

This year, we have some interesting things planned to offer a chance for a little soul rest, for reconnecting with each other as a parish family, and for looking into the darkness together as we make our way to the other side. We actually begin our Lenten work on the Sunday before Lent (Feb. 14), when our GSP children will take away our hallelujahs and bury them until they rise again on Easter Sunday. On Ash Wednesday we begin Lent in earnest with four (yes, four!) services to include the Imposition of Ashes. Our third service will be a special children's service, by and for children, that includes an experiential lesson about this holy season; we will include the Imposition of Ashes, but not a Eucharist at this service. In adult education, Chuck Dickson will lead us into an exploration of one of the most ancient forms of worship known to us, the penitential Great Litany. And each Sunday we will take some time to share a soup lunch together in the parish hall after the 10 a.m. service. Holy week will include a Maundy Thursday potluck culminating in the solemn stripping of the altar and watch before the cross. And on Good Friday we will add a very different Stations of the Cross service on the labyrinth.

So instead of giving up something this year (wine? chocolate? texting?), or taking on something else (extra charity work?), why not look at all you do now and switch — try something different for Lent? I've so

From the Senior Warden

The end of 2009 marked 18 full months of transition between permanent rectors for Grace St. Paul's. Even though it feels at times like we are standing still, this transition period has also been a time of great change as we continue to grow as members of the Body of Christ, living out our mission to call "people to change the world" and engaging in a process to articulate who we are and what we seek for the future of our parish. In this process I believe we are learning a great deal about the gifts and talents among us!

In 2009, we were blessed with the pastoral and administrative leadership of two different interim rectors, the Rev. Harold O. Clinehens, Jr. and the Rev. Deborah Heathcock. We are grateful for the gift of their presence among us, for the individual and unique ministries they offered, and for the ways those ministries have provided us with a reflection of who we are as a community of faith.

This past year was also notable for the following highlights:

- A Parish Summit was held on March 21, hosted by members of the Search Committee, where members of the congregation gathered to share their stories about GSP, to reflect on who we are at our best, and to begin creating a vision of our future.
- Harriet Claiborne accepted a call to GSP as part-time Director of Children's Ministries. Harriet's gentle presence, her strong faith and her passion for children have served to add new and creative energy to our children's program.
- We said goodbye to Fr. Harold and Beverley Clinehens in mid-May as they left to serve the congregation of St. John the Baptist in Lodi, Calif. The vestry and the people of GSP worked together over the summer

months to keep the parish running smoothly until we welcomed the Rev. Deborah Heathcock as interim rector in mid-August.

- We began a second fundraising campaign to pay off the debt for the HVAC loan and, in the process, discovered that raising money can be both creative and fun, involving the talents of many in our congregation.
- GSP hosted J. Philip Newell for a very successful Advent retreat on Celtic Christian Spirituality that was attended by over 100 people.
- Our many inreach and outreach ministries continued to grow and flourish under the direction of gifted leaders and the work of many dedicated volunteers, serving both the parish and the community beyond GSP.

This list is not, in any way, exhaustive and just barely offers a glimpse of the enormous commitment of time and energy made on behalf of this congregation's mission by its members over the past year.

I encourage us to look forward to 2010 with hopeful hearts. We are not standing still. This coming year we will call a new rector to help us discern and guide us toward the fulfillment of a new vision of who God is calling us to be as a community of faith and the Body of Christ in Tucson, Arizona. In that process, I expect that we will be challenged by important stewardship decisions about the care of our aging facility and staffing for growth. It will be a time to clarify our vision, our commitments and grow together!

As we make these steps, I hope we will discover and live to the fullest the spiritual gifts with which we have been blessed, honoring those gifts in one another and finding ways to encourage their expression. Some of us will be healers, some of us will be teachers, some of us will be prophets, some of us will be leaders, and some of us will discover new callings, new and unexpected joys—the possibilities are limited only by our ability to recognize those gifts and use them. I pray that, with God's help, we will do just that.

Report from the 2010 Annual Meeting

Grace St. Paul's 2010 Annual Meeting was called to order at 12:15pm, following a sumptuous potluck lunch provided by parishioners. The meeting was opened with participants singing Christ Above Me and a prayer offered by the Rev. Deborah Heathcock, the Interim Rector. Deborah then announced that Catherine Penn Williams would continue to serve a fourth year as Senior Warden. Catherine reminded the gathering that while the Senior Warden normally serves no more than three one-year terms, the by-laws of GSP provide for the sitting Senior Warden to continue during a transition period until the newly called permanent Rector has been in place for 90 days.

A motion to approve the minutes from the 2009 Annual Meeting was passed. Tom Pitello, chair of the Nominating Committee, introduced the slate of candidates for election to the Vestry: Linda Hutson (Junior Warden); Pete Weiblen, Margaret Scott, Donna Olson Shreve, Chris LaBour (3 year terms); and Tricia Galvin (unexpired 1 year term). A motion to elect the slate of candidates by acclamation was passed. Catherine acknowledged the contributions of retiring Vestry members Cathy Wolfson (3 years), Tom Pitello (3 years) and Aimee Graves (8 months). Catherine presented Jeffrey Stewart (Junior Warden, 3 years) and Bob Hutson (Treasurer, 5

years) with an Anglican rosary for their enormous service to GSP. Both received a standing ovation from the congregation. Catherine also announced that non-voting officers of the Vestry would be elected at the first Vestry meeting in February: Richard Shumway (Treasurer), Kathy Creath (Clerk) and Ralph "Nick" Nickerson (Chancellor).

Juden Thomas made a presentation requesting donations for UNICEF to help the children of Haiti and offered a serving of homemade payasam, an Indian rice pudding (delicious!), for each \$10 donation.

The following people were nominated to serve as delegates to Diocesan Convention on Oct. 15-16, 2010: Pat Meyers, Beth Miksa, Chris Ledyard, Karen McVean, Terry Shreve, Kay Bigglestone, Marilyn Abraham, Allison Towner, Michael Allen and Steve Williams. The congregation cast their ballots for five delegates and two alternates. The eYouth13 graciously volunteered to count the ballots. Those elected as delegates were: Terry Shreve, Beth Miksa, Kay Bigglestone, Chris Ledyard and Steve Williams; Allison Towner and Marilyn Abraham will serve as alternates.

Bob Hutson presented the financial report for 2009 from a PowerPoint presentation created by Richard Shumway, Kathy Creath and Catherine Williams. Highlights of the report included:

- most of the income came from pledges and

Notes from the Choir Stalls

The season of Epiphany is about divinity revealed. There is the divinity of Jesus, of course, but also the divinity manifested in each of us (and I'm not talking divine dress, darling). Each church season has a focus—for example, anticipation in Advent and introspection in Lent. Perhaps Epiphany can be the season of perceiving. God is revealed to us when we look closely enough, in even the most appalling things. It's hard to find God in the Haitian earthquake, unless you look at the effort of dusty and bleeding hands to pull a fellow human from the rubble, or the groundswell of love and concern from around the world. I don't believe earthquakes are God's will. There is no giant scorecard in the sky that says if you do "this", you will be preserved from "that". Thank heavens, because otherwise we'd either be in a world of hurt or the most boring people in town.

Epiphany music reflects the lectionary, or that's the plan. Jesus is revealed through his works, and we marvel and try to emulate. Not to diss anyone who believes they are saved by grace alone, but good works are always appropriate. We will not celebrate Candlemas (the Presentation of Christ in the Temple) this year as such. However, on Feb. 7 we will sing a setting of the Song of Simeon (*Nunc dimittis*) by choir member Winifred Williams, who trained in music composition.

As Epiphany yields to Lent, the tone changes from looking outward to looking inward. Lent is a struggle. Do I take the easy route, which is to schedule those ash-dripping penitential anthems that are at my fingertips, or seek different ways to see Lent? As always, I choose a bit of both. For Ash Wednesday, we're doing the Herbert Howells "Like as a hart desireth the waterbrooks." Hey, if you can't drip ashes on Ash Wednesday, when else can you do it? The communion anthem will be a rich offering from Lift Every Voice and Sing II: "In God we trust."

Never forget that anticipation is an important part of life... without excitement you have nothing.

For a different Lenten perspective, I'm pulling in anthems from the Iona community. We can't call it contemporary—this collection is at least twenty years old—but it's more contemporary than, say, the Howells. It's important to make the journey of Lent in another pair of boots, as it were. Music from other faith traditions and cultures serves to illuminate our own.

We've added a new alto, Joyce Henderson, who was left off the roster printed in my annual report because she hadn't joined yet when I submitted it. We are grateful for her service and greet her with high-fives. The choir is maintaining equilibrium. We'll see where we are after Easter. Lent and Holy Week can be exhausting for the choir. No, let me rephrase that, *is* exhausting for the choir. Pamela and I are paid to be tired, but a volunteer choir willing to go through all that is golden. It's sort of the good work emulating that of Jesus. In our chaotic, overscheduled and over-stimulated society, taking the time to be with Jesus every step of the way through Lent and Holy Week is tough.

Prayer, fasting, alms, sin, sixteenth century anthems about prayer, fasting, alms, and sin... it's our history, but wallowing in it is not our future. I had a joke in there about how it works for me, but actually it doesn't. It took me years to break the 24/7 Lenten habits of thinking, and none of us needs to go back there again. Mind you, sometimes sin is tempting (otherwise it wouldn't be sin). The sin I'm contemplating at the moment is Spike-icide, if he keeps, shall we say, marking his territory randomly around the house. But there are other ways to observe Lent than feline-murder, and we shall explore them. May the remaining season of Epiphany reveal that of God in the world around you and may your Lent be a rewarding journey.

Christmas comes so quickly upon us after Thanksgiving, it seems, that I look to this period of time, between Christmas and Lent, as a time of holy transition: a moment to remember the “Yes!” in Mary’s heart as she accepted the gift of being chosen by God to be the Savior’s mother. ...A moment to feel the wonderment of the shepherds as they found the baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger. ...A moment to adore the child, Jesus, as the Magi did after following his star for so long. It is only then that I am ready to ponder Jesus, all grown up, teaching and healing and always pointing to God. We know He will become the Good Shepherd, the True Vine, the Living Water, the Light of the world. But He will also suffer and die and rise again in order to reconcile us to God, our Creator. The inherent beauty of our denomination is that we are called to be with Jesus as his life unfolds, and we do that within the context of liturgy. Liturgy brings the Bible to life, and gives us a place to enter history with the great I AM.

And how do we give this gift of faith and love to our children? We affirm the children when we invite one to serve at the altar every week. And this last Advent, when the children sang a beautiful hymn that they had practiced for a long time with Jane Click and Steve Brookbanks, you welcomed our presentation. On Christmas Eve, you smiled at the shepherds and sheep on their way to find the newborn babe and the multitude of angels that crowded around the lowly manger. You have hand-made materials for our first atrium in the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd and you have come to our classrooms and talked to our older ones about your faith – not always an easy thing to do. You have given us whatever we need, financially and spiritually, to do God’s work. I find Grace St. Paul’s to be a welcoming place, where children and grownups can stretch and grow and love and learn. I think Jesus feels that too, and that is why I see Him every Sunday.

In this class we will examine how the places of our lives may become sacred, where the Presence of Christ, the true bond of Christian Community, may be revealed and experienced. We will also consider the Celtic approach to space, place, and the sacred.

While they are visiting lonely or ill parishioners and serving in many outreach capacities as Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs) and with Joseph's Pantry, Bread for the Pantry, and as supportive visitors with friends and relatives not in the parish, they will meet monthly in two Circles of Care to deepen their training and resolve problem areas in their work.

The first Circle of Care is based on the northwest side. Its first meeting will be at the home of Ann Schlumberger on Friday morning, Feb. 5 from 10:30 to noon. Subsequent meetings are set

for March 12 and April 9 at other homes.

The second Circle of Care is based on the central and eastside area. The first meeting will be Sunday, Feb. 7, in whatever Undercroft room is available at GSP from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. During Lent, this group will meet on Saturday morning, March 10, at the church, but after Easter it will resume Sunday meetings, beginning on April 11.

The sponsoring agency, Community of Hope, provided training materials for a series of instructional sessions last fall. Many parishioners participated as trainers, including Joe Fitzgerald, The Rev. Rick Wilson, Suzanne Nystrom, Linda Hutson, Nadine Martin, Lynn Marie Hunter, Sally Shumway, Lynne Albright and Virginia Zuelow. Subsequent training sessions may begin next fall for newcomers to join the group.

plate; pledges were down about \$8,000 as might be expected in this economic climate;

- most of our operating budget goes to salaries/benefits, Diocesan Assessment and maintenance of the buildings and grounds;
- for the first time in memory, GSP is in the black—by \$20,000!
- a shortfall of \$35,000 is expected for 2010 due to increased expenses for the rector search; monies to cover the shortfall will come from the Emergency Reserve Fund (ERF) unless income from other sources increases;
- ERF balance is now at \$232,000; the Endowment Fund continues to grow and is nearly where it was at end of 2007; and
- projected shortfall for HVAC loan is now \$56,000; Tom Pitello will continue to spearhead fundraising for this.

A motion to accept the Financial Report as presented was passed.

After singing a hymn, O God, Our Help in Ages Past, the congregation heard a report from Lynne Albright and Ernie Galaz, co-chairs of the Search Committee. They announced that

the Parish Profile has been approved by Bishop Smith and is now available to read online at GSP's website. The job opening for rector at GSP is also now listed with the Church Deployment Office for prospective applicants to see. Copies of the Parish Profile are available to view in the church office as well. Kudos to John Banks for doing such a fine job of completing the graphic layout for the Profile. The Search Committee will begin interviewing candidates as soon as they receive applications that have been vetted by the Bishop's staff. The Search Committee hopes to give the Vestry the names of three final candidates to interview in early May. The Bishop has told Catherine that he expects we will have many good candidates to choose from.

Ernie announced that there will be parish lunches at 11:30am on the five Sundays in Lent preceding Palm Sunday; at the lunches, parishioners will engage in a series of dialogues on topics of Worship, Spiritual Formation, Outreach, Stewardship and Our Vision. These dialogues will serve as new steppingstones on our journey

Class on Great Litany prepares us for Lent

There will be a class on the Great Litany at 9 a.m. on Sunday, Feb. 7, in anticipation of our using that service on the First Sunday in Lent.

A litany consists of various petitions said or sung by the leader with fixed responses by the congregation. Some people do not appreciate such intercessions and so commonly use the word for a long and tedious recital, such as in the expression "the patient recited a litany of complaints."

The Great Litany, found in the American *Book of Common Prayer* beginning on page 148, is substantially the same service as the first English language rite prepared by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer during the English Reformation and is thus the oldest liturgical service in the English vernacular. It was the only officially sanctioned service in English to be finished within Henry VIII's lifetime. That monarch had noticed that people were not responding to religious processions as he thought they should, and so he decreed in June of 1544 that there were to be "set for the certayne godly prayers and suffrages in our natyve Englyshe tongue." He thought that such prayers would be useful during England's war with France and Scotland in that year.

Cranmer quickly published in the same year what turned out to be the first installment

of the *Book of Common Prayer*, first authorized in 1549 during the next king's reign. Part of its full title is "a letanie with suffrages to be said or song in the tyme of the said processions."

The Litany is a superb example of Cranmer's mind at work. He derived it essentially from the medieval Sarum litany as well as from a theologically revised German litany issued by Martin Luther in 1529. Cranmer also consulted the Greek Orthodox Litany.

Cranmer's Litany is often considered to be the finest form of prayer in our language and is the most comprehensive of all the prayers of the *Book of Common Prayer*, embracing what we used to call "all sorts and conditions of men."

Our current version of the Litany retains much of Cranmer's traditional language. It includes an "invocation" of the Trinity; a series of "deprecations" that seek deliverance from evil, spiritual harm, and natural calamities; a series of "obsecrations" that plead the power of Christ's incarnation, life, death, and resurrection for deliverance; prayers of general intercession; the *Agnus Dei*; the *Kyrie*; the Lord's Prayer; a versicle and response based on Psalm 33:22; a concluding collect; the grace; and a final supplication.

The 9 a.m. class on the first Sunday in February (Feb. 7) will be led by Chuck Dickson, who has forty years of experience teaching mainly on the college level.
