The Bishop is Coming!

The Bishop is Coming!

We start off the program year this month with a big bang. On Sunday, Sept. 11, Bishop Kirk Smith will be at Grace St. Paul's for his official annual visitation. The purpose of the Bishop's visitation, as he describes it, is to give us an opportunity to share with him the good news of what is going on at GSP, as well as for him to share with us the work of the Diocese. In addition, this time is for us to be in fellowship with one another and to "preach and celebrate the sacraments as a representative of the larger church."

Traditionally, this has meant that the Bishop will offer Confirmations, Reception and Reaffirmation of vows to the congregation. **Confirmation** is presently going through a bit of an identity crisis in the Episcopal Church, as those of you who took our *Episcopal 101* class may remember. But for the purposes of the Bishop's visit, we will use the following definitions of the three. Confirmation will be for those who have been baptized in any Christian tradition at an early age who would like to make an adult commitment to their faith. Typically, this is the rite that teenagers participate in who were baptized before they remember. This year, our teenagers have not yet finished their preparation for Confirmation, so we will not be confirming them at this service.

Reception is for *all* individuals who have been baptized in any Christian tradition that want to be a member of the Episcopal Church. We have many people in this category this

year. If you have come to GSP from any other faith tradition or denomination and want to officially become a member, this is for *you*. This applies not only to all of you who have come here in the last year or two, but everyone who has never been anointed by a Bishop. My guess is there are many of you who have attended here or another Episcopal church for years and never become official. This is the time and place. There are no initiation rites involved other than the Bishop marking your forehead with chrism and reciting these words: "We recognize you as a member of the one holy catholic and apostolic church, and we receive you into the fellowship of this Communion. God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, bless, preserve, and keep you. Amen." ('Catholic' in this sense refers to the universal church). That's it. Our hope is that we will totally blow the Bishop away with the number of people being received this year. Please prayerfully consider joining us.

Reaffirmation of Vows is for those who have previously been confirmed or received, but would like to publicly reaffirm their commitment to the church. This year, we have many people who have transferred their membership from other Episcopal congregations to GSP. This is the category that we will use to formally recognize you as a member of Grace St. Paul's on Sept.11.

If you are ready to be Received or Reaffirmed and have not yet called or emailed the office, please do so as soon as you can, no later than Sept. 6. We need the following information from each of you, full name, mailing address, the date of your baptism (as close as you know it—the year is okay), the geographical place of your baptism and the church or denomination where you were baptized. If you email, please do directly to Steve+ since KiKi will be out of the office. If you have any questions about the process or want to discuss this in further detail, please contact Steve+ as soon as possible.

In the case of those who want to be Received into the church and are not yet baptized, please contact Steve+ immediately.

Sept. 11 will be a hugely exciting day for all of us. Don't miss it.

Equinox Liturgy

One of our goals at Grace St. Paul's is to utilize liturgy to help us understand and feel the connections among God, people and all of Creation. We have done well through much of church history linking the first two together. However, for centuries the third part was nearly excluded. The notion that God is also experienced through the natural world was dropped from much of Christian theology, perhaps in a desperate attempt to protect us from pantheism, the understanding that the earth is God. Only our Celtic tradition was able to preserve some of our ancient Christian roots and the knowledge that one of the most effective ways to experience God was through the natural world.

What we lost as a result was our own deep connection to the earth and the connection between the cycles of the universe and the reality of God. In an attempt to alleviate this loss and help us reconnect with God through the natural world, we have instituted the season

of Creation, which will begin this year on Oct. 9. Last year we added special liturgies to mark the turning of the seasons and each of our equinox and solstice services were big hits. We have now come full circle in our seasonal liturgies.

Come join us this year as we continue our new tradition. Let us link again those Celtic roots and rediscover the experience of God through the change of the seasons. This year's celebration of the Fall Equinox will be on Thursday, Sept. 22 at 6 p.m. in the same slot as our regular *Spirit Now* service. Please join us as we gather on the labyrinth for this short, informal, but meaningful liturgy. The service will include a walking meditation for those who are able and is designed to help us reestablish our relationship to God through creation and each other.

Come check it out, and let us know what you think.

Greeting Ministry

Caring for and loving one another is obviously a central part of the mission of Grace St. Paul's. In some way, all of our ministries are built around this component. Two of our ministries though, are especially focused on hospitality. Ushering offers an opportunity to meet and greet with people attending a service and to make sure that everyone feels welcomed, comfortable and oriented. Our Welcome Table volunteers are also all about hospitality. Their job is to specifically care for visitors.

Mainline church studies suggest that people who are greeted sincerely, with love and in an unobtrusive manner are more likely to return to that church. However, if the visitors are also contacted individually in the week following their visit, the odds of their returning go up exponentially. That has also been my personal experience both here at GSP and in other congregations. Our return visit ratio is over

70 percent when we are able to send a thank you note.

The issue that we presently have is that the only people we can greet in church and send thank you notes to are those that voluntarily go to the Welcome Table. Once there, the staff does a great job in caring for them and getting the information needed to contact them. But as we all know, mainline Christians are not often over the top extroverts. People left to their own, will for the most part avoid making such contact.

Presently, our ushers have too many other responsibilities to have time to identify a visitor and care for them. Our Welcome Table staff also cannot "leave their post" to do such identification. What this means is that if we are to care for people to the maximum extent and make them feel as welcomed as possible, we need an in-between group. We need folks who feel called to identify visitors as they

Notes from the Choir Stalls

The new choir season commenceth, hallelujah, amen. We start on Sept. 11, on the occasion of the Bishop's visitation and the reception of new members. It is also registration day for children and youth activities. There's a lot going on.

I am delighted to report that the choir has gained weight. We have a significant number of new and returning members, and at least three of them are first tenors. Does that rock or what? Let me tell you, I've been doing my chicken dance all over the place. Of course, we don't have enough books or vestments to accommodate them, but what a problem to have, eh? I think we can cope.

In order to take advantage of the augmented men's section (after all, everyone likes an augmented men's section), we will begin the season with the Tchesnokoff "Salvation is Created" for the offertory. It's more often done on Christmas or Easter, but I think it works well for baptism and reception, and hey, we have all those men for divided tenor and bass parts. We have to do a Russian piece; it's the law.

The music program at Grace St. Paul's is growing, as well. Joan Brundage and Jane Click have been steadily building the St. Cecelia's Choir for the grade school age children, and I am organizing an ensemble for high school and college age persons. What shall we call it? To be really contemporary, we'd need to put a zombie in it. How about St. Zeno's Zombie Choir? Who wouldn't want to join that?

All interested parties will have a chance to sign up for these and other children and youth activities on Sept. 11. Joan, Jane, and I will provide various kinds of musical instruction.

You must provide your own zombification, although as any parent of an adolescent child can tell you, zombification usually takes care of itself on school mornings. We are hoping that the youth zombies will be able to provide music about once a month, occasionally for the 10:00 service but also for the new bi-weekly Sunday night Complaine service.

The adult zombies will be singing the usual GSP mix of styles and centuries. A little gospel here, a little Anglican verse anthem there. Last year I held off, because the poor thing is nearly beaten to death, but this year we are reprising the William Byrd "Teach me, O Lord, the way of thy statutes." I love it, and I'm hoping that Ari and/or Minda Dettman will sing the solos.

Although you may note a repeat here and there, we will also be doing a lot of music we haven't done before. Some of it is brand new. For All Saints', we will sing a work by Dr. Pamela Decker, the Grace St. Paul's organist, entitled "Taste and See," which was just premiered this year. I'm also working to bring Paul Amiel, the neh player, back for the first Sunday in the Season of Creation. We may do an anthem in Turkish. You never know. For the last Sunday in the season of creation, we're doing one in Hebrew—*Mizmor le toda* (Psalm 100), by the Baroque composer Salamone Rossi.

So stay tuned to this station for further announcements. With prayer and medication, we will have a great year!

Our Spiritual Gifts

Spiritual gifts are funny things. A few months ago I took a spiritual gift survey that was a series of random questions. For example, one question was, “I have spoken in tongues”. Assuming that “speaking in tongues” wasn’t referring to my French classes, I answered, “No.” Another question was, “I am able to make a stranger feel comfortable in my home, or at meetings, or at church.” I rated myself a little higher on that one. At the end, the survey ranked my responses and correlated them to 25 different gifts, including such diverse options as apostleship, giving/generosity, prayer, proclamation and martyrdom (on which I admit I scored very low.)

I can’t say I was surprised at the results. Administration was deemed my main spiritual gift. After more than 20 years in business administration that makes sense. The surprise was that administration was considered a spiritual gift. I thought of spiritual gifts as healing touch or pastoral care. Administration seems like a skill, not a gift. The survey results made me examine what a gift really is.

I think of gifts as natural abilities. I’d guess that most of us know what would be our top ranked gift. Do you know what might be your second or third ranked gift? How many gifts are we graced with? Plus, what are we supposed to do with our natural abilities? Just because we have a natural ability, we may not enjoy that particular pursuit. Our gifts may be from God, but it’s up to each of us to decide what to do with them. Do we hide them from the world or share them freely? These are all questions we have to answer for ourselves.

One of the best opportunities available to you as you explore your spiritual path is coming up on Oct. 2. This is our Annual Ministry Fair. All the different ministries at Grace St. Paul’s will be showcasing themselves in McBride Hall after both the 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. services. I encourage everyone to attend. The ministry fair is a great time to talk to the

ministry leaders about two very important things. First, you may find we have people who can support you in your pastoral needs. Second, this is where you can find your niche in serving others in this community.

I’d like to encourage you to seriously think about sharing your gifts freely with all those around you. One of the amazing things in life is that we are all blessed in different ways. Only when we share those blessings with others are we whole as individuals and as a community. For example, another less obvious spiritual gift identified was financial support of the church. Without contributions from all of us, the church can’t function—it can’t be whole. Without the church, all of the ministries that we practice wouldn’t exist. This gift rises up and flows out into our wider community. That’s also true of the investments of time we gift to all the ministries here at Grace St. Paul’s. Opening yourself up can bring innumerable gifts back to you. I hope that is something you are able to experience on a daily basis.

The morning of the harvest arrived, and I met everyone in the GSP parking lot. I was a bit nervous going with people that I did not know, however the group treated me like I was their friend from the beginning. The harvest was an amazing experience, and the people made me feel like I was truly part of the group.

Then I saw that GSP held a Healing Touch clinic. Next was an invite to attend Spirit Now. Each time I went to the church, I was greeting warmly with hello's and hugs, and everyone was so genuine and caring. It was then I looked online for weekly activities, which ended up helping me out again. I brought my papers to shred for \$5 donation, attended a free movie night, and signed up my daughters for the Art Camp. The same experience happened again and again with the warm welcome. I had a HUGE box of shredding and was embarrassed when I saw the smaller boxes other people left. There was no reason to worry, another warm welcome by James White. At the movie night I could not find the room; no worries, Dyan Duggins introduced herself in the hall and accompanied me. For the Art Camp, I was concerned that my daughters would have trouble meeting people. Again there were no worries. Right away, Rosalind Garcia found ways to include them.

Then we decided to try out a Sunday service. My daughters and I went to church together as a family for the first time in years. It was wonderful! Both of them were astounded that everyone was invited to share in the Holy Eucharist, and pointed it out to me in the Bulletin. We went up together as a family to share together the Holy Eucharist for the first time ever, and Father Steve made sure we knew we could participate in whatever way was meaningful to us. I can't even begin to describe how monumentally important this was for us as a family.

The sermon was incredible and spoke right to me. I cried... the girls were worried, and it made for such healing conversations on the way home. I was not looking for a church, but am eternally grateful that I found one.

We are already planning for future services so we can bake something to bring to fellowship afterward, and my daughter, Kelsea, and I have even signed up to lead a Spirit Now service in September, and here I am writing an article for the church newsletter already! The welcome we received gave us the courage to jump in with both feet, and we are so thankful for our new spiritual home, and our new church family.

God Is Present Here

Barbara is a tiny 5-foot-tall lady of about 80 who lives solely on her meager social security check. On her first visit to the pantry, she told me that she had not eaten for three days. She now receives a Community Food Bank box every month and a few supplemental cans of chili, soup, and fruit along with bread another time in the month. We have vowed to her that she is never again to spend a day without food.

Barbara is not alone in her need. Last winter one of our many struggling families arrived with children in tow. Fortunately we had just received a large selection of girl scout cookies. I suggested to the 8 year old boy that as a treat he choose his favorite box. He took several minutes to select a box of chocolate cookies; then looked up at me with tears of disbelief and joy in his eyes.

Our volunteers give food, showers, socks,

bus passes, clothing vouchers and pet food to 250-300 people like Barbara and this little boy every week. The need has become so much greater as the elderly, working families and homeless are stretched to make ends meet. The poverty level for a family of four is \$22,350. 24% of families and 30% of children in Tucson live below this level.

Indeed Joseph's Pantry is also stretched as we continue to feed the hungry and provide a safe haven and sense of community to those who are most neglected and discriminated against in our community.

Every can or dollar we receive allows us to help one more person get through the day without hunger. And the gratitude and tears that we observe when we distribute food and other items are a constant reminder that God is truly present at Grace St. Paul's. Perhaps Barbara said it best recently when she told a volunteer, "Other places make you feel as though you are taking their time. You bless my whole week."



Some people claim that NLP can help clear the mind of that which hinders your focus on the Divine.
